### Chapter I International Day for Tolerance 16<sup>th</sup> November

















### II. osnovna škola Čakovec















To prepare for this activity teachers discussed with students in class what tolerance means for them. Each student had their own idea, but finally, they all agreed that tolerance means accepting and respecting others regardless of their beliefs, race, health condition, skills or what they own. On this occasion, our 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders, accompanied by their English teacher and a librarian, visited a school for special educational needs students in Čakovec (Centar za odgoj i obrazovanje). Our two schools organised three workshops there. The first one was the Reading Corner. A student from our school read out a story about a peacock without feathers, which was followed by a discussion led by our librarian. Afterwards, we had an English workshop. Students from our school and students from the SEN school, individually and in pairs, helped by the English teacher, learnt about food, body parts and spoke mini-dialogues from everyday life. Teachers from SEN school held a pottery workshop, where students individually created beautiful Christmas decorations. The aim of this activity was to strengthen students' cultural awareness and expression, as well as social and civic competences. This visit was a chance to raise awareness of the fact that we were not all born with the same skills, but anyone can overcome obstacles if they try hard enough. International Day for Tolerance was traditionally marked by our visit to the local school for students with special educational needs (Centar za odgoj i obrazovanje). For us, it is a day when we point out the need to promote tolerance, respect and appreciation for all the members of society, as well as to raise the awareness of the dangers of intolerance. A visit to such a school provides our students with an opportunity to see that students who find it difficult to cope with regular curriculum can still be very skilful at some fields, and there is so much we can all learn from them.

Our 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders were chosen to represent our school for this visit, along with our librarian and Croatian teacher. Our team was warmly welcomed, with both students and teachers anxiously expecting us. At the beginning of the meeting teams from both schools introduced themselves. A teacher from the host school presented their work: the school is widely known for its clay artwork. Students from both schools were shuffled and then split into groups. They were instructed how to make Christmas tree decorations - to cut pieces of clay, roll out the clay and model it, engraving lace pattern. Students enjoyed the workshop, helping each other, learning from their peers. Through this valuable activity, students had a chance to strengthen their social and civic competence.


## 9th Primary School Limassol















On November 16<sup>th</sup>, during the International Day for Tolerance, our A' Grade students hosted our school children from the Day Center Mario's' Home. Mario's Home also provides help for adults with special needs. They were all involved in various activities, such as cooking and crafts. Tolerance day is a day for respecting the cultures, beliefs and traditions of others and understanding the risks posed by intolerance. It is a day for respecting people with disabilities. The understanding and acceptance of people with disabilities is an essential characteristic of a good citizen and an essential component of a good education. The aims of the activities of this day were:

- to reflect on the meaning and personal relevance of tolerance;
- to begin to understand the importance of tolerance;
- to identify values of tolerance;
- to reflect carefully on the meaning and significance of tolerance.

Specifically, the 1st-grade children and children with special needs from Mario's home participated in three workshops. The first workshop was a handicraft workshop, the second workshop was a cooking workshop and the third workshop was about music and singing. The participants also spent quality time together during the breaks.

The children wrote about their feelings. In addition, some children became journalists and interviewed their classmates about the emotions and thoughts they experienced during the Tolerance Day.

We marked the International Day for Tolerance in a special way. We organized a "live library".

Through this process, people who are experiencing social exclusion or groups of people who are forgotten and blocked from society are invited to the school. In particular, a priest, an African man, a cancer patient, a very old man living in a nursing home, a person with many tattoos were invited to the school. These people, due to their status or origin, or because of their appearance, or simply because of their age, have experienced various forms of social racism.

Children had the right to "borrow" one of these people like a book and ask them questions about their experiences and their feelings. In this way, our students developed empathy and took strong messages through the answer of the quest.

Before the activity, students watched videos, read articles and discussed in the form of a debate on social exclusion issues. Then they were divided into groups and wrote questions that they could do to quest.

Also, children of the 3rd grade read the book "Happy Meadow". A book devoted to diversity. In a meadow only with white daisies grows a reddish poppy. Daisies react. Finally, the daisies accept the poppy.


Children through this book have been taught that friendship, love and understanding make life easier and more beautiful and that the integration of the different can bring more harmony and beauty.

After reading the book students did some creative work. Each student made and painted his/her own flower, and on the petals of the flower, he/she wrote things that characterize him/her and make him/her different.

The aim of this activity was to represent through art their individualism, their identity and what renders them unique... at the same time, the different colours represented what connects them with other pupils in the class in terms of interests and faces of their personality...

## Szkoła Podstawowa nr 19 Legnica















Tolerance is currently a very important issue, nowadays being different is observed by our children at every turn. Tolerance means not only the openness but also the ability to respect others. Each child has to understand that being different does not mean to be a worse person. Each person has the right to be respected and to live according to their own values. We have to respect everyone, no matter their age, gender, skin colour. Though, some behaviours must not be tolerated, for example: telling lies, aggression, breaking the law. Before our children are ready to recognise the differences in culture or religion, they see the differences in attire, appearance, height or attractiveness. Students have to be aware that these are not the most important features. We cannot choose the way we look; we cannot choose the shape of our nose or face and these features do not determine the kind of person you are. Our school counsellor organised a series of lessons for students to increase their level of awareness in this area. Students watched a movie Maciek's Birthday, followed by a lot of discussions, games, plays, art lessons, drama lessons showing some tolerant and intolerant behaviours.

We talked about what tolerance really is and what values it brings with it. We paid attention to the fact that without respecting the views, beliefs and tastes of another person and without respect for him, regardless of who he is, what he looks like, what he can and where he comes from - it would not be possible to create a positive school climate and our closest surroundings!

Class II students, to better understand what tolerance is, celebrated the World Day of the Dot. They got to know a story about a dot that changed the world of a small Vashti, or about Vashti, who thanks to a dot believed in herself.

We would like to thank all students and teachers for their commitment to preparing this day. The students' readiness to become actively involved in such school projects shows that we are able to cooperate and give our best!

Our pupils from class III a, together with the tutor, decided to make a surprise to the charges of the Social Welfare Home Grabski in Legnica. The students presented a verbal and musical assembly and handed out gifts. Emotions and smiles appeared on many faces of the viewers.

Our school is deeply involved in the celebrations of the International Day of People with Disabilities. Our celebrations for the International Day for Tolerance are combined with this day.



#### **International Day for Tolerance 2018**

On 16th November is the International Day of Tolerance, proclaimed by the UN to recall the inspiring principles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and to combat extremism and promote intercultural dialogue.

Tolerance is not taken for granted. It must be taught, nurtured and communicated. Education, especially at school, is essential to strengthen tolerance and combat hatred and discrimination. On this International Day for Tolerance, we explained the importance of dialogue and understanding between all peoples and communities without any discrimination or marginalization. For each of us, it means living and working together on the basis of mutual respect for the richness of human diversity.

Our school plays a valuable role in the processes of cultural integration by bringing together children of different nationalities and various social background.

In the secondary school classes, students discussed emigration, Italy's position in this movement, the importance of hospitality. They then produced posters and sang songs of various nationalities.

Tolerance is like a plant, we must sow it in young minds, we must constantly water it so that its roots take root in society and we must protect it from parasites such as hatred and discrimination.


# Şcoala Gimnazială Nr. 1 Independența















#### **International Day for Tolerance 2017**

Participants: 194 students from primary and lower secondary level

Students have been put in situations of understanding the attitude of tolerance/intolerance and those accompanying them: peace, conflict, help, indifference, acceptance, respect etc. Activities carried out were: case studies based on watching cartoons or suggestive video; reading and commentary based on specific theme texts; applying questionnaires to students measuring thus the degree of acceptance in their group of friends of those peers, neighbours, acquaintances who belong to a different religion, to a different ethnic group, or have different financial opportunities; transferring into drawings the examples of tolerance or intolerance found either in the readings or in the viewed films; making posters, collages or puzzles; summarising thus the concept of tolerance and of tolerant behavior.











#### **International Day for Tolerance 2018**

To accept behaviour and beliefs that are different from your own, although you might not agree with or approve of them, this is tolerance. This day was celebrated by almost all the teachers at our school. Teacher Elena Costin with her 2<sup>nd</sup> grade started the activity by dividing the students into groups. The terms, tolerance, intolerance, peace, conflict, help, indifference, acceptance, respect were the icebreakers in the activities that led to a brainstorming, where the children contributed with a variety of ideas and examples. Some suggestive movies were viewed and specific topic texts were read.

In the end, the students sought to recreate through scenes from which they have shown examples of tolerance or intolerance found in readings or movies. Proof of tolerance was also the fact that during the whole day the activities/games were also performed on groups where each of them accepted any colleague as a partner, regardless of ethnicity, relationship.


Meanwhile, in another classroom, teacher Marian Ochianu with his 5<sup>th</sup> grade choose to discuss tolerance with the students. The activity started with a warm-up, "I would or wouldn't tolerate", each of the students expressing their position on the above statement. Then a few students read the definition of tolerance and some notions about it. After the discussion ended, all the students had to make posters about the notions and situations presented during the lesson.

# Chapter II International Day of People with Disabilities 3<sup>rd</sup> December

















### II. osnovna škola Čakovec















Our second graders and their teacher Dunja Mikulaj had a guest — a mother of one of the students, who kindly told them a story about her life. She has used a wheelchair since she was thirteen - it was difficult for her at first but eventually, she got used to it. She graduated at a faculty, works and has a family. The children had a chance to try moving in a wheelchair and walk with their eyes blindfolded, to see how disabled people must feel in their everyday activities. Our seventh graders watched a short film about a teenage girl with a disability. They also tackled the "disability etiquette" - how to treat people with disabilities with respect. After the presentation pairs of pupils had a task to highlight the rules of good communication, they find the most important. Here are some of them: Speak directly to a person with a disability, not to their companion; Respect their personal space; Offer your arm - don't take theirs; Be specific when giving directions; Always ask before you help; Children with disabilities and interested in the same topics as all other children. The output is the film about the meeting in the second grade and the students' activities there, also to be used in the future for educational purposes.

Our 7<sup>th</sup> graders, led by their English teacher, marked 3rd December, the International Day of People with Disabilities. As a preparation, in pairs, they did research on rules about how to interact with persons with disabilities and reported the results to their class. All students had a task to select the rules regarding the etiquette with people with disabilities they find the most important and create audio animations using Web 2.0 tool Voki. Students also participated in role-plays, taking up the roles of persons with visual impairment. They tried walking through the classroom with their eyes blindfolded, helped by their classmates. They tried to recognise certain objects only by touching them. In the end, they shared their impressions with their classmates. We managed to have our students empathize with people with disabilities and strengthen their social and civic competence.

## 9th Primary School Limassol















#### **International Day of People with Disabilities 2017**

To mark the International Day of People with Disabilities, on 4<sup>th</sup> December 2017, at our school we hosted an event with the participation of athletes with disabilities from the athletic group Hephestus.

Our students familiarized themselves with the work of the athletes in basketball, using their wheelchairs during a match. The students and their teachers had also the opportunity to practice with hand bikes.

The students of 2nd grade (B1) created posters which depict the needs and the capabilities of people with disabilities. By these, they addressed the message that "all people are different, but equal when it comes to their aspirations and personal fulfilment". The students of Grade C got involved and analyzed the poem "Susan laughs" by Jeanne Willis and Tony Ross. They did a variety of exercises related to the story.

The International Day of Persons with Disabilities aims to promote the rights and well-being of persons with disabilities in all spheres of society and development, as well as to increase the awareness of the situation of persons with disabilities in every aspect of political, social, economic and cultural life.

To mark this important day, on 3rd December 2018, at our school we hosted a Civil Engineer, Mr Kyriakos Tsioupanis. Mr Tsioupanis has an artificial leg because of an accident during serving the army. He was invited to our school to talk about the inner strength he had that enabled him to study abroad and overcome every difficulty he had to face.

Following the event, that took place on 3rd December, in the coming few days, the students were taught issues related to diversity and had produced different kinds of creative assignments and activities. In particular, the first-class children wrote acrostic poems with the word RESPECT. They wanted to give the message that people with disabilities need respect, not pity.

Establishing the International Day of People with Disabilities, on 3<sup>rd</sup> December, the UN wanted to focus the attention to the problems of this social group and emphasize the necessity of actions for the integration of the people with disabilities with the rest of the society.

The aim of the annual celebration of the Day of People with Disabilities is:

- 1. drawing the attention to the rights of people with disabilities, disseminating the idea of tolerance, openness and respect for otherness, as well as showing the benefits of the full integration of people with disabilities in political, social, economic and cultural life;
- 2. bringing the school community closer to the problems of people with visual, auditory and motor disabilities, as well as raising our students' awareness of the subject of disability.

Our students participated in sensory workshops, during which they had the opportunity to experience how people with disabilities, visually impaired, hearing impaired and children with autism get to know and perceive the world. Students tried to overcome a forest, stony road and high curb moving on crutches, they recognized objects without the use of sight, and only by touch and smell, they learned signs of sign language or read textbooks tailored to the needs of blind students. Much of the excitement was aroused by information about the difficulties in functioning in society and the specific behaviour of people with autism.

In addition, the students visited the elderly, disabled people and they showed the Christmas performance prepared by themselves. Being among those people, they saw how they are struggling with problems and how to help them.

The celebrations of The Day of People with Disabilities showed that children are very sensitive to the needs of people with disabilities, fully accept them and are open to work and play together.

The International Day of Disabled People is celebrated around the world on 3rd December every year. It was established by the General Assembly of the United Nations in 1992 at the end of the Decade of Disabled Persons.

The purpose of the celebrations was to familiarize the school community with the problems of people with visual, auditory and motor impairment, as well as to increase the awareness of our students about the disability. As in the previous year, support teachers carried out the action "3rd December or Yellow". That day the school was dominated by a yellow colour. In this way, we have solidarized with people with disabilities.

As a part of school celebrations, sensory workshops for children from grades 1-3 were prepared. During the classes, students experienced how to get to know and perceive the world of a person with motor, visual and auditory disabilities. Children with blindfolds recognized the flavours and smell of products demonstrated by teachers and arranged wooden jigsaw puzzles. These struggles brought students closer to the specificity of the functioning of the blind. The next tasks our children were facing were exercises, consisting of recognizing sounds and writing dictations, with stoppers in their ears. In this way, students learned about the difficulties that deaf people face. The last exercises that pupils from grades 1-3 did, were slalom between the bollards without the use of legs, drawing geometric figures with the help of feet, and stacking the tower from blocks, with kitchen gloves on their hands. Participation in these activities made the children aware of the problems encountered by people with mobility disabilities in their lives. At the end of the meeting, students participated in a sign language lesson. The youngest got to know the dactylography, that is, the finger alphabet and the gestures defining the polite phrases. Older students watched a multimedia presentation that included information about the types of disability and the aspirations of people with disabilities. They learned that the most important desire is the need for equal treatment, which translates into access to communication, information and space. They were also acquainted with the savoir-vivre guide for people with disabilities.





They analyzed the scenes presented in the presentation, pointed out positive and inappropriate behaviours, as well as familiarized themselves with the basic rules in contact with people with dysfunction.

Pupils' profiles of famous people affected by disability were presented, including Janka Mela, Monika Kuszyńska, Natalia Partyka, Karol Bielecki.











### **International Day of People with Disabilities 2018**

3rd December, the International Day of People with Disabilities, is a very important day at our school. "It's normal to be different" is our motto. Every year teachers work with children on a peculiar issue, which has to do with people, their identity and human relationships. This year the theme is Ikigai. Ikigai is a Japanese word that cannot be translated with a single word in English. Ikigai is a treasure in our soul, that we have to discover and cultivate day by day, to live happily, in peace with ourselves and with other people. We could say it's our reason to live.

What is my passion?
What am I good at?
What's the reason I wake up every morning?
What can I do for other people?
What does the world need?

Around these questions, we can build big thinking about what we are and how we can live our life fully, taking care of us and of other people. If we focus on it, we will discover that also in the little details of everyday life we can find seeds to make our souls blossom. Every team proposes this theme in his class in many different ways: reading books, interviewing children, reflecting together on the meaning of these words, writing stories or poems, finding the words to describe pupils' talents and the way they can help other people through them. After these activities, each class realizes an artwork to be exhibited in the hall of the school on 3rd December.

## Şcoala Gimnazială Nr. 1 Independența















In order to change attitudes, as well as to create and develop an empathic behaviour towards the disabled, the students from 3rd, 4th and 8th grades were asked to search some information about the disabled which they turned into drawings, posters or messages. The school psychologist explained to the students the concepts of disability and infirmity.

We organised an interactive meeting between the students and a disabled person. This person has told the children about the incident which lead to his disability and has put him into a wheelchair, his feelings, how his life is today. The children asked a lot of questions trying to find out what obstacles he has to deal with every day.

M.B.M. has shared a few of the difficulties he had to face: the inability to walk, depression, ignorant people, the lack of access ramps at the entrances of the buildings. With the help of his family and psychologists, he managed to overcome all these obstacles and today he is very proud that he is an active person that can move easily in his wheelchair, he can drive and he also attends different charities for other disabled people.

The students have been challenged to play the part of a disabled person, to use the wheelchair and they have realised that it is not easy to live like this. They have discovered that the disabled people are not different from us, they only do things, which we think normal, a little bit different. Many disabled can fit perfectly in our society, they can learn, they can work, but they need the necessary conditions to do that and it depends on us to provide them. In the end, the students have handed in cards and messages to support and encourage their guest.







During the activities for the International Day of People with Disabilities 2018, teachers from Independenţa had the following aims:

- to identify a group of people with special needs;
- to define the terms: "disability", "infirmity",
- to list the main disabilities that can exist in people;
- to identify the causes of the deficiencies studied, on the basis of discussions;
- to express their own opinions in connection with various situations;
- to specify, with the help of the teacher, the ways in which people with disabilities in order to carry out various activities;
- to list at least three tips for normal people in connection with their behaviour towards people with special needs.

2<sup>nd</sup> graders, with their teacher Costin Elena, watched a meaningful film and particular texts were read, the basis on which students made different drawings from stories or from the film they just watched that made them feel the best. In the end, each team presented their work to the class by arguing their choice. The teacher used various methods: exposure, conversation, exercise, etc..; "modern" methods, such as case study, project method.

The 4<sup>th</sup> graders with their teacher Ene Antigona watched an animated film Cuerdas (The Fringes). The film captures the beautiful friendship between a child with a disability and a little girl and how it helps them both their friendship. The conclusions of the film were drawn: a person with special needs little of us, just the attention and acceptance that can make a person happy, also if you help such a person you can discover yourself, you will realize what do you want to do in your lifetime.





The preparatory class with their teacher Mocanu Valentina had the activity We Are All Different. The students have been able to deal with disabilities (visual disability, locomotor disability) during breaks to make them better understand what it is like to be a disabled person whenever it may happen to become such a person.

Methods aimed at forming skills and abilities: exercise and a lot of practical work were used.

All in all, students have become familiar with the term disability, then they have experienced what it means to have a disability and made their own exhibition of drawings.

# Chapter III Holocaust Memorial Day 27<sup>th</sup> January

"More than 75 years after the young Czech poet Pavel Friedmann famously penned a farewell poem to "the very last" butterfly at the Terezin Concentration Camp, the children of the world have answered Friedmann with "the largest migration of butterflies ever seen." The students of our school with teachers Dunja Mikulaj and Monika Vrtarić Vuk marked The Holocaust Remembrance Day by creating an art installation, consisting of butterflies, created by students of grades 3, 7 and 8 individually. The techniques applied for this activity were watercolours, crayons and collage. Later, at a special presentation, a group of 3rd graders recited the poem The Butterfly. Our 8th graders learnt about the Holocaust within history lessons: with their teacher Snježana Odak Hrkač they had a workshop where they were split into four groups. They had an assignment to do research about four young people, victims of the Holocaust: Anne Frank, Petr Ginz, Lea Deutsch and Avraham Koplowitz.

They thought about how they might have felt and wrote monologues – what would have they said if they had been able to talk to us? After the workshop, four pupils of grade 8 presented themselves as Anne, Lea, Petr and Avraham and shared their thoughts at a special presentation with other students, their teachers and the headmaster, who all gathered to pay tribute to all innocent victims of war.

They also listened to the song Dona, Dona by Rachel Hyman, and watched the film The Last Flight of Petr Ginz. Everything we heard was deeply emotional. We wanted our students not only to learn about the facts but also to have them try their best to see through those people's eyes. The aim of this activity was to strengthen student social and civic competence. The outputs of this activity are the art installation of butterflies, educational posters and monologues in Croatian and English, published on our project website (https://brankalamza.wixsite.com/innovate-together/int-remembrance-day).

During the last week of January, we marked the Holocaust Memorial Day. Students of grades 3, 7 and 8 took part in different activities within classes of History, Art and English. Our 3rd graders drew a picture book, to commemorate a boy Tomáš Fritta and his family. Bedřich Fritta was a technical draughtsman, graphic designer, and cartoonist, who lived in Prague. In December 1941, Fritta was deported to a concentration camp, where he drew a picture book, dedicated to this son, Tomáš, for his third birthday. His intention was to show his son a normal life, outside the concentration camp. Our students of year 3 learnt about the life of the little boy and decided to draw a picture book themselves, and dedicate it to Tomáš. They named the picture book Life is Beautiful. Within history lessons, students of grade 8 learnt about the notions of the Holocaust, genocide, crimes against humanity, victim, executor, passive observer, saver - Righteous Among the Nations. Students were split into groups, in which they did research on racial laws, ghettos and concentration camps. Each group presented the results of their work using posters. Within Art lessons, students of grades 7 and 8 drew a comic, based on a chapter of a novel Sadako Wants to Live by Karl Bruckner, about a Japanese girl named Sadako Sasaki who lived in Hiroshima and died of illnesses caused by radiation exposure following the atomic bombing of the city in August 1945. The best drawings were exhibited in the school hall. Within English lessons, students of grade 8 read a biography of Lea Deutsch, a child actress, who used to be called Croatian Shirley Temple. Unfortunately, her career, as well as her life, were ended on the way to Auschwitz. The second activity did within English classes was reading a story about a Dutch girl, faced with a dilemma whether to help her Jewish friend and risk her life or not. The school also joined the international Crocus Project. Students of grade 8, accompanied by their History teacher, planted crocus bulbs in the shape of David's star. We managed to have our students empathize with innocent victims of war and develop their social and civic competence.

Commemorating the Holocaust Memorial Day on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2018 and culminating the activities pertaining to the Holocaust, which were underpinned by the aphorisms of the philosopher Theodor Adorno "To write poetry after Auschwitz is a crime" and " art is the social antithesis of history and society", students of grade 3 got involved in an interdisciplinary project of depicting through art these atrocities and the suffering of children throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> century and globally, thus exceeding the confines of the *Second World War* and providing a global and a trans-historical antiwar protest.

On Holocaust Day, children of the third grade watched the movie "The Boy in the Striped Pajamas". The film is a 2008 historical tragedy film, set in World War II, based on John Boyne's 2006 novel of the same name. The film is about a nine-year-old boy Bruno, who knows nothing of the Final Solution or the Holocaust. He is oblivious to the appalling cruelties being inflicted on the people of Europe by his country. All he knows is that he has been moved from a comfortable home in Berlin to a house in a desolate area where there is nothing to do and no one to play with. Until he meets Shmuel, a boy who lives a strange parallel existence on the other side of the adjoining wire fence and who, like the other people there, wears a uniform of striped pyjamas. Bruno's friendship with Shmuel will take him from innocence to revelation. And in exploring what he is unwittingly a part of, he will inevitably become subsumed by the terrible process.

The children felt related to the film's heroes and a lot of feelings flooded them. In the art class, the students created beautiful drawings based on the film. In the Greek language class, they wrote about their feelings after watching the film,



As part of the celebration of the Holocaust Memorial Day, students from our school visited the Gross Rosen Museum in Rogoźnica. We saw the exhibition "At the risk of living - Poles saving Jews during the Holocaust". The exhibition was devoted to those who helped the Jews during the Second World War. In addition, we learned about the specificity of German occupation in Polish territories, the division of the city space into ghettos and the "Aryan side", sanctions that threatened anybody helping Jews. The main role in the narrative is played by the individual fates of the Poles who survived - above all those awarded by the Yad Vashem Institute in Jerusalem with the title Righteous Among the Nations. It is through their biographies that everything that during the war and the Holocaust is a testimony to both the greatness of man, his sacrifice and great goodness, as well as meanness and the dormant evil inside him. The exhibition there used the priceless collection of more than 400 interviews with the last Righteous Among the Nations in Poland, which was collected in the '07-'13 in the framework of the museum project "Polish Righteous - Recalling for Memory




















KL Auschwitz was a German Nazi concentration camp that existed in 1940-1945. His first prisoners were Poles. In subsequent years, prisoners of other nationalities were also imprisoned there. From 1942, Jews became the most numerous group directed to KL Auschwitz, they were also the largest group of victims. The Holocaust is a planned, institutionally organized and systematically carried out the extermination of 6 million European Jews during the Second World War.

In Auschwitz, at least 1 100,000 people died, including almost a million Jews, 70-75 thousand. Poles, 21 thousand Roma, 14 thousand Soviet prisoners of war and 10-15 thousand victims of other nationalities.

Here is the statement that one of the prisoners remembered:

"You came here not to a sanatorium, but to a German concentration camp, from which there is no alternative but to the chimney. If you do not like it, you can go on the wires right away. If there are Jews in transport, they have no right to live longer than two weeks. If there are priests, they can live for one month, the rest only three months."

### **Auschwitz - Memorial Site**

This is one of the most important places in the world where the most tragic act of crime in the history of mankind has been made. It has become a symbol of the evil that man is capable of.

A visit to the Memorial Site is a difficult and painful experience that triggers a series of reflections and important questions that are often not answered.



The Irish Holocaust Education Foundation (HETI) has provided us with crocus yellow bulbs to plant in memory of the one and a half million children who died in the Holocaust and thousands of other children who were victims of Nazi atrocities. The yellow flower recalls the yellow of the Star of David that the Jews were forced to sew on their clothes during the Nazi rule. The crocuses have flowered around the date of the Day of Memory. These beautiful flowers also remind us that after the most terrible events, a new life begins and we can hope that everything is better than it was before. The flowers remind us that in the world there is still beauty and hope for our future. The class actively participated in the project, doing a search among hundreds of thousands of children who were killed by the Nazis, each student dedicated a flower to one of those children. On Memorial Day they remembered and prayed because the most effective weapon against every kind of madness and evil is a memory.


This year's Holocaust Memorial Day was marked by the reading of a book for children: The Whispering Town. This book is excellent as a first introduction to the Holocaust for students.

First of all, the book was read while walking in the underground area of the school, where pupils had to move according to whispers, as in the book. After this direct experience, many class activities followed.

The conversation started with a discussion of laws. How important is it to follow laws? What are the consequences of not following the laws? Is there ever a time that following the law is the wrong thing to do? Would you be willing to risk your life to help a stranger? Then children were directed to thinking about helping others. Mass numbers of refugees from the middle east are seeking asylum in Europe and the USA. Some Westerners welcome the refugees and want to help; others say the refugees place too great a burden on the countries' economies. What does welcoming them mean for us? What was it at the time of Nazi Germany?

Then, another issue was explored: courage. What does it mean to be courageous? Think about someone from history or your own life whom you admire for acting courageously. What did that person do that took courage? How would you have felt if you were in the same situation?

After all these activities, the book was read again and children expressed their opinion and feelings. The activity was closed by creating the "whispering town", using fabric.

Holocaust Remembrance Day was celebrated with the students from 8th grade, in their history and optional subject (*The history of the Jews. The holocaust*) class, for it is part of the school curriculum. They organized an exhibition with drawings and posters they made within this topic.







We marked the Holocaust Memorial Day in various ways:

- Students from 8A grade, with their main teacher, Oana Manole, discussed the poem by Pavel Friedmann, The Butterfly, and translated it. Based on the poem, they made paper butterflies.
- Students from 6th and 7th grades, inspired by the same poem, decorated a pinboard with a lot of butterflies.
- The activity for the 3rd-grade students, coordinated by teacher Ana-Maria Stegaru started with a PowerPoint material on the chosen topic. She had invited also Adrian Mihailescu, the history teacher, who told them more about the event: causes, countries involved, consequences. Then, team-topic posters were made and finally, we watched sequences from the movie "The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas".
- Adrian Mihailescu: the 8th and 7th-grade students watched the Pianist movie and then discussed a few sequences trying to highlight the main points of what the Holocaust meant.
- Mihaela Mihailescu, teacher of history too, organised an interesting online match between students from 7th and 8th grade and victims of the Holocaust. It was an online wall where all the victims of Holocaust were presented (photo, parents, age, job, birth and death) The students had to work to a Romanian presentation of the matched victim and upload it on a Padlet.

#### Book Day 2018

As one of our project tasks was to mark a Book Day at our school, we decided to mark the World Storytelling Day. It is a global celebration of oral storytelling, taking place every year on the March equinox. To prepare for this day, teachers had pupils choose favourite stories and prepare for storytelling to their peers in the school library. They chose stories or excerpts from the books When the World Was New by Jurg Schubiger, The Jungle Book by Rudyard Kippling, Diary of a Wimpy Kid by Jeff Kinney and other books. Some students also created illustrations for their stories.

In Italy a whole week is dedicated to books and reading. 

To prepare the Book Day 2018, our 5th graders got an assignment to study the places to be visited at the LTTA in the UK, in April: Rainton Meadows Nature Reserve, the Beamish Historical Outdoor Museum, New Castle and Durham, and prepare presentations for their classes.

Our 6th, 7th and 8th graders got an assignment to read travel guides related to at least one city from all partner countries. Students borrowed travel guides through Lisbon, London, Rome, Warsaw, Zagreb, Nicosia and Bucharest from the library. They found printed travel guides very interesting, especially because they offer a more detailed description of sites that the Internet.







On 1st February, we celebrate the International Day of Reading Together, a global event organized by LitWorld, annually marked millions of people in over 100 countries, to signal the importance of reading together with children, the child's need to read 20 minutes a day, even from the first days of life and even after reading alone.

In Romania, 2019 is also declared the Year of the Book, and International Reading Day Together which brings joy to the children to discover books, the activities being carried out under the generic "Read to Know", and the chosen lectures concerning various fields Literature, Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics. "The treasure from the end of the rainbow" was the starting point in our debate. Starting with predictive reading, asking and searching for explanations, the children discovered elementary notions about the things and the phenomena that surround them. Through practical examples and experiences, they could learn about natural phenomena, rainbow colours, how plants and animals grow and need, first aid techniques, trust, and who we give it, about friends, friendship and tolerance, geometric bodies. Also, in Romania, we celebrate a great author of the Romanian literature, Ion Creangă. In his honour, our students Mihai, Ambra and Ana acted a role-play. They made a video where they were playing some important scenes from a beautiful story "Memories from childhood".



# Earth Day 2019

We marked Earth Day by various activities. Our second graders (2.B) and a group of 7<sup>th</sup> graders, accompanied by the class teacher and the art teacher, visited the kindergarten Žibeki. For this occasion, our students prepared a theatre show Little Explorers, tackling the topic of jungle animals in Africa and the blue whale – the largest animal ever known to have lived on our planet. After the theatre show, students of year 7 taught kindergarten children how to shape paper relief. They cut waves out of blue collage paper, folded the paper and stuck it on the background. In groups, they created an ocean representing a home for the blue whale. Older students felt proud to share their experience with younger children.

Students of year 3 (class 3.a) and their teacher Dunja Mikulaj explored chromatic and achromatic colours, within their art classes. They tackled the following motives: Earth Day - Earth in the past and future, fish and Water Day. Furthermore, in their Science class, they learnt about endangered species in their home region of Međimurje. They explored the notion of endangered species, where they live and what we can do to help them.

Another activity to mark Earth Day took place in our school garden. Together with our religion teacher, students discussed what to plant. They chose aromatic herbs. These herbs will later be used to make healing creams for the skin. Students of year 6 and 7 gathered in the school garden, planted seeds of chamomile, marigold, comfrey and other herbs and watered them. We are all looking forward to the beautiful scents in our garden. Our students will regularly take care of the plants, at the same time spending more time in the fresh air, applying their knowledge in science, chemistry and biology in practice. Healing creams to be produced later are to be sold on the school charity fair. Competence addressed by this activity is a sense of initiative and entrepreneurship.







#### **Europe Day 2018**

So, we read the story "The Country Mouse and the City Mouse" and checked our knowledge through a comprehension quiz about the story and the quiz "How much do you know about Portugal/Croatia?" 

All activities helped our students expand their knowledge about EU countries and raise their awareness as European citizens.



### Our Local Day – Our Special Day Cyprus National Day or EOKA Day and Greek Cypriot National Day

1<sup>st</sup> April represents Cyprus National Day, also known as EOKA Day and Greek Cypriot National Day, which marks the date when the EOKA rebellion fought for Cyprus to gain independence against the British Colony began.

1<sup>st</sup> April is a different holiday from Cyprus Independence Day, which is celebrated on 1<sup>st</sup>. Cyprus had been under British administration since 1878 after the island was handed over in an agreement with the Ottoman Empire for the British military support, if needed, against Russia.

On 1 April 1955, the EOKA (Ethniki Organosis Kyprion Agoniston or National Organisation of Cypriot Fighters) guerrilla organisation was established and fought for Cyprus' independence from colonial Britain, and for union with Greece (known as 'Enosis').

During the commemoration day of the EOKA or known as the Greek Cypriot National Day, most schools hold tributes and programs in their classes to educate the students about the history behind this special event in the country.

In our school in order to mark this special day, there was a program at our school, consisting of musical, dance, recitations and theatre performances by all students of all of the classes of our school. The performances watched by all the students and their parents. Through their performances, they honoured important heroes of the EOKA organization and remembered the historical events of the struggle.






#### Our Local Day – Our Special Day St. Michael's Day


